

Carle, Eric. *Rooster's off to see the world.*

NY, Little Simon, c1972, 2002. A simple introduction to the meaning of numbers and sets as a rooster, on his way to see the world, is joined by fourteen animals along the way.

P CARLE

Asch, Frank. *Barnyard lullaby.*

Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, 1998. Although the farmer only hears animal noises, when the different barnyard animals sing lullabies to their respective children, the babies understand the words. Includes music.

P ASCH

Bateman, Teresa. *Farm flu.*

NY, Albert Whitman, 2001. When the farm animals catch the flu one after another, a young boy does his best to take care of them.

P BATEMAN

Craig, Lindsey. *Farmyard beat.*

NY, Alfred A. Knopf, c2011. The sounds of the farm animals create a lively beat that keep Farmer Sue, the chicks, sheep, and other farm animals awake.

P CRAIG

Dodd, Emma. *Meow said the cow.*

NY, Arthur A. Levine Books, [2009], 2011. A noisy rooster causes a disgruntled cat to cast a magic spell that creates confusion among the other farm animals.

P DODD

Egan, Tim. *Serious farm.*

NY, Houghton Mifflin, c2003. Farmer Fred takes his work very seriously and so do his animals, until they decide to make the farm more fun and find a way to make Farmer Fred laugh.

P EGAN

Ehrlich, Amy. *Parents in the pigpen, pigs in the tub.*

NY, Dial Books for Young Readers, c1993. Tired of their usual routine, the farm animals insist on moving into the house, so the family decides to move into barn.

P EHRlich

Elliott, David. *On the farm.*

Cambridge, MA, Candlewick Press, 2008. Gives a view of the world of the family farm.

P ELLIOTT

Fleming, Denise. *Barnyard banter.*

NY, Holt, c1994. All the farm animals are where they should be, clucking and mucking, mewing and cooing, except for the missing goose

P FLEMING

Fox, Mem. *Hattie and the fox.*

NY, Bradbury Press, c1986, 1987. Hattie, a big black hen, discovers a fox in the bushes, which creates varying reactions in the other barnyard animals.

P FOX

Galdone, Paul. *Henny Penny.*

NY, Clarion Books, c1968. A cumulative tale about Henny Penny and her barnyard friends who were literally outfoxed on their journey to tell the king the sky was falling.

P GALDONE

Gammell, Stephen. *Once upon MacDonald's farm.*

NY, Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, [1981], 2000. MacDonald tries farming with exotic circus animals, but has better luck with his neighbor's cow, horse, and chicken--or does he?

P GAMMELL

Gershator, Phillis.

Moo, moo, brown cow, have you any milk?

NY, Random House Children's Books, 2011. Through rhyming text, farm animals are asked if they have items needed to prepare for a snack and bedtime, such as wool for a blanket, down for a pillow, and milk to drink.

P GERSHATOR

Harrington, Janice N.

The chicken-chasing queen of Lamar County.

NY, Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2007. A young farm girl tries to catch her favorite chicken, until she learns something about the hen that makes her change her ways.

P HARRINGTON

Herriot, James. *James Herriot's treasury for children.*

NY, St. Martin's Press, 1992. A collection including "Moses the Kitten," "The Market Square Dog," and "Smudge, the Little Lost Lamb."

P HERRIOT

Huneck, Stephen. *Sally goes to the farm.*

NY, Abrams, c2002. Sally, a black Labrador retriever, goes to a farm where she enjoys various activities.

P HUNECK

Krilanovich, Nadia. *Chicken, chicken, duck!*

Berkeley, CA, Tricycle Press, c2011. Easy-to-read, rhythmic text about a group of farm animals, led by a tenacious duck, who play a noisy game together.

P KRILANOVICH

Krosoczka, Jarrett. *Punk Farm.*

NY, Alfred A. Knopf : Distributed Random House, 2005. At the end of the day, while Farmer Joe gets ready for bed, his animals tune their instruments to perform in a big concert as a rock band called Punk Farm.

P KROSOCZKA

Lewisohn, Wendy Cheyette.

Going to sleep on the farm.

NY, Dial Books for Young Readers, c1992. A father describes for his son how each animal on the farm goes to sleep.

P LEWISON

Lindman, Maj.

Flicka, Ricka, Dicka and the big red hen.

Morton Grove, IL, A. Whitman, [1960], 1995. While caring for their aunt's chickens, three little Swedish sisters are upset when the big red hen disappears.

P LINDMAN

Long, Loren. *Otis.*

NY, Philomel Books, c2009. When a big new yellow tractor arrives, Otis the friendly little tractor is cast away behind the barn, but when trouble occurs Otis is the only one who can help.

P LONG

MacLachlan, Patricia. *What you know first.*

NY, HarperCollins Publishers, 1995. As a family prepares to move away from their farm, the daughter reflects on all the things she loves there so that when her baby brother is older she can tell him what it was like.

P MACLACHLAN

McPhail, David M. *Farm morning.*

San Diego, Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, c1985. A little girl and her father do early-morning farm chores.

P MCPHAIL

Meng, Cece. *Tough chicks.*

Clarion Books, c2009. Three independent chicks are reprimanded by the other barnyard residents for not being quiet and docile, until the smart, fearless trio takes on a runaway tractor.

P MENG

Michelson, Richard. *Tuttle's Red Barn : the story of America's oldest family farm.*

NY, G.P. Putnam's Sons, c2007. In 1632, John Tuttle set sail from England to Dover, NH. His farm on seven acres of land became America's story.

P MICHELSON

Most, Bernard. *The cow that went oink.*

San Diego, Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, c1990. A cow that oinks and a pig that moos are ridiculed by the other barnyard animals until each teaches the other a new sound.

P MOST

Pearson, Susan. *Squeal and squawk : barnyard talk.*

Marshall Cavendish c2004. A collection of humorous poems about barnyard animals and activities.

P PEARSON

Provensen, Alice. *The year at Maple Hill Farm.*

NY, Atheneum, 1978. Describes the seasonal changes on a farm and surrounding countryside throughout the year.

P PROVENSEN

Ransom, Candice F. *Tractor day.*

NY, Walker & Co., 2007. Simple rhyming text describes a child's day spent riding on the tractor with Daddy at their small farm.

P RANSOM

Rector, Avis. *Carl helps on the farm.*

Seattle, Peanut Butter Publishing, 1995. We follow Carl as he spends a day of discovery on his grandparents' farm. Colorful photographs illustrate many tasks associated with life on a farm.

P RECTOR

Regan, Dian Curtis. *Barnyard slam.*

NY, Holiday House, c2009. Farm animals express themselves at a poetry slam hosted by Yo Mama Goose.

P REGAN

Schaefer, Carole Lexa. *Full moon barnyard dance.*

Cambridge, MA, Candlewick Press, 2003. A beautiful night and a full moon inspire a dance by the pond.

P SCHAEFER

Simont, Marc. *The goose that almost got cooked.*

NY, Scholastic, c1997. A goose drops away from the flock and settles in at a farm, where life seems very pleasant for a while.

P SIMONT

Small, David. *George Washington's cows.*

Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 1997. Humorous rhymes about George Washington's farm where the cows wear dresses, the pigs wear wigs, and the sheep are scholars.

P SMALL

Tafari, Nancy. *All kinds of kisses.*

NY, Little, Brown, c2012. Each barnyard animal has its favorite kind of kiss, but the best of all is a mother's goodnight kiss.

Spots, feathers, and curly tails.

NY, Greenwillow Books, c1988. Questions and answers highlight some outstanding characteristics of farm animals, such as a chicken's feathers and a horse's mane.

This is the farmer.

NY, Greenwillow Books, c1994. A farmer's kiss causes an amusing chain of events on the farm.

Waddell, Martin. *Farmer duck.*

Cambridge, MA. Candlewick Press, 1992. A glorious and utterly satisfying modern fable illustrated with that special blend of humor and pathos unique to bestselling artist Helen Oxenbury.

Daddy played music for the cows.

Minneapolis, MN. Windward Pub., 2004. A young girl grows up on a farm to the sound of music from the radio her father plays in the barn.


P WEIDT
