Toronto, Kids Can Press, 2007. Mrs. Eleanor Marlowe leads a daring double life. By day she works at the Purrington Street Library with her fellow cats, but at night she returns home to a family of mice.

Baker, Keith. *Hickory dickory dock*.

Orlando, Harcourt, c2007. Rhythmic text expands on the Mother Goose rhyme, including a variety of animals that react as the clock strikes one through twelve.

P BAKER

Brett, Jan. *Town mouse, country mouse*.

NY, Putnam, c1994. After trading houses, the country mice and the town mice discover there's no place like home.

P BRETT

Burkert, Rand. *Mouse & lion*.

NY, Scholastic, 2011. An adaptation of Aesop's classic tale about an unlikely friendship between a mouse and a lion in which an act of mercy proves to be a lifesaving gesture.

P BURKERT

Carle, Eric. *Do you want to be my friend?*

NY, Harper Collins, [1976]

A mouse searches everywhere for a friend.

P CARLE

Cousins, Lucy. *Maisy goes to preschool*.

Somerville, MA, Candlewick Press, 2009. Maisy the mouse has a busy day at preschool dancing, painting, singing and doing other things, in one of her many adventures.

P COUSINS

Emberley, Rebecca. *The lion and the mice*.

NY, Holiday House, c2011. A proud lion learns that little mice can be his friends.

Mice on ice.

NY, Holiday House, c2012. Colorful mice go ice skating and are unexpectedly joined by a feline friend.

P EMBERLEY

Freeman, Don. *Norman the doorman*.

NY, Puffin Books, c1959, 1981. Norman, the doorman of a mouse hole in an art museum, uses his own art talent and finds a way to see the art treasures in the galleries upstairs.

P FREEMAN

Friedman, J. S. *Maurice's valises: moral tails in an immoral world. Book I, In the beginning*.

Amsterdam, Mouse Prints Press, [2013]. The first book in the series follows Maurice, an endearing mouse, through his quest to learn life's lessons.

P FRIEDMAN

Fyleman, Rose. *Mice*.

NY, Beach Lane Books, [2012] Simple, rhyming text celebrates what is nice about mice. Lois Ehlert, illus.

P FYLEMAN

George, Lindsay Barrett.

Inside mouse, outside mouse.

NY, Greenwillow Books, c2004. Two mice, one who sleeps inside the house in a clock and one who sleeps outside the house in a stump, follow complicated but strangely parallel paths and meet each other at a window.

P GEORGE

Gorbachev, Valeri. *Molly who flew away*.

Philomel Books, c2009.

Molly the mouse buys so many balloons for all her animal friends at the fair, she gets carried away into the air.

P GORBACHEV

Grey, Mini. *Hermelin the detective mouse*.

NY, Alfred A. Knopf, [2013], 2014. A mouse with typewriting skills secretly helps the people of Offley Street find lost items, and eventually saves the day.

P GREY

Henkes, Kevin. *Lilly's purple plastic purse*.

Greenwillow Books, c1996. Lilly loves her teacher, but when he asks her to wait before showing her new purse, she does something for which she is very sorry later.

Wemberly worried.

NY, Greenwillow Books, 2000. A mouse finds that she has a whole list of things to worry about when she faces the first day of nursery school.

P HENKES

Kraus, Robert. *Come out and play, little mouse*.

Greenwillow Books, c1987. Along with *Where are you going, little mouse?* and *Whose mouse are you?*, one of three mouse stories with illustrator Jose Aruego.

P KRAUS

Kuhlmann, Torben.

Lindbergh: the tale of a flying mouse.

NorthSouth Books, Inc., 2014. In a country far away, a new invention--the mechanical mousetrap--has caused all the mice but one to flee to America. Now stranded in a dangerous country, the last mouse decides to build a plane and fly to the land of freedom.

P KUHLMANN

Lionni, Leo. *Matthew's dream*.

NY, A. Knopf, [1991], 1995. Along with *Frederick*, *Nicolas, where have you been?*, *Theodore and the talking mushroom*, and *Tillie and the Wall*, Lionni's mice charm.

Knopf, [1971], 2009.

P LIONNI

Martin Jr., Bill. *"Fire! fire!" Said Mrs. McGuire*.

Orlando, Harcourt, c2006. In this version of the old rhyme, the fire turns out to be smoke from the candles of a birthday cake.

P MARTIN

Numeroff, Laura Joffe. *The best mouse cookie*.

NY, Laura Geringer Books, 1995. This mouse reappears at school, Christmas, Easter, Valentines, and *If you give a mouse a cookie*.

P NUMEROFF

Omusubi kororin = The rice balls and the mice

Tokyo, Gakken, 2002. A story of a kind old woodcutter and a greedy old hunter. One day, when the woodcutter drops a rice ball on the ground, a surprise comes back.

P OMUSUBI

Pinkney, Jerry. *The lion & the mouse*.

Little, Brown and Co., 2009. A wordless retelling of an Aesop fable set in the African Serengeti.

P PINKNEY

Potter, Beatrix. *The tale of two bad mice*.

Frederick Warne ; Penguin, [1904], 1996. While the dolls are away, Hunca Munca and Tom Thumb explore the dolls' house and steal their furniture.

P POTTER

Riley, Linnea Asplind. *Mouse mess*.

Blue Sky Press, c1997. A hungry mouse leaves a huge mess when it goes in search of a snack.

P RILEY

Schoenherr, Ian. *Cat & mouse*.

NY, Greenwillow Books, c2008. A cat and a mouse play together nicely--and not so nicely--to the nursery rhymes, "Hickory, Dickory, Dock," "Eeny, Meeny, Miney, Mo," and "I Love Little Pussy."

P SCHOENHERR

Steig, William. *Doctor De Soto*.

Farrar, Straus, and Giroux, c1982. Dr. De Soto, a mouse dentist, copes with the toothaches of various animals except those with a taste for mice, until the day a fox comes to him in great pain.

P STEIG

Stein, David Ezra. *The nice book*.

G.P. Putnam's Sons, c2008. Monkeys, mice, snakes, cats, and many other animals demonstrate how to act towards others.

P STEIN

Step toe, John. *The story of Jumping Mouse : a native American legend*.

NY, Lothrop, Lee & Shepard Books, c1984. The gifts of Magic Frog and his own hopeful and unselfish spirit bring Jumping Mouse finally to the Far-Off Land where no mouse goes hungry.

P STEPTOE

Tashiro, Chisato. *Five Nice Mice*.

Penguin Young Readers, c2007. Five mice hear wonderful music and find that it is a frog choral concert in the park, with no mice allowed. Returning home, they decide to create an orchestra, practice, and finally put on a fantastic show.

P TASHIRO

Titus, Eve. *Anatole*.

Alfred A. Knopf, [1956], 2006. Paul Galdone illustrates this and three other books about the cheese-loving French mouse.

P TITUS

Tompert, Ann. *Just a little bit*.

NY, Houghton Mifflin, 1993. When Mouse and Elephant decide to go on the seesaw, Mouse needs a lot of help from other animals before they can go up and down. Lynn Munsinger, illus.

P TOMPERT

Tyler, Gillian. *Froggy went a-courtin'*.

Cambridge, Candlewick Press, 2005. The well-known folk song about the courtship and marriage of the frog and the mouse.

P TYLER **Powerwall** **Songs**

Waber, Bernard. *Do you see a mouse?*

Houghton Mifflin, 1995. Everyone at the ultra-fancy Park Snoot Hotel insists that there is no mouse in the hotel, but the reader can see a mouse in each illustration.

P WABER

Wallace, Nancy Elizabeth. *Look! look! look!*

NY, Marshall Cavendish, c2006. Three mice "borrow" a postcard painting, and learn about color, pattern, line, and shape. Includes instructions for making and sending a postcard.

P WALLACE

Wheeler, Lisa. *One dark night*.

San Diego, Harcourt, c2003. Mouse and Mole feel afraid one dark night crossing a mush-mucky swamp and a marsh-misty wood.

P WHEELER

Wormell, Christopher. *Mice, morals and monkey business: lively lessons from Aesop's Fables*.

Running Press Kids, 2005. Colorful linoleum-block prints depict the classic characters from Aesop's Fables.

P WORMELL

Wahl, Jan.

The field mouse and the dinosaur named Sue.

Scholastic, c2000. A field mouse is transported to the Chicago Field Museum with the bones of a Tyrannosaurus Rex.

P WAHL

Walsh, Ellen Stoll.

Dot & Jabber and the big bug mystery.

Harcourt, c2003. *Mouse Shapes*, *Mouse Paint*, and *Samantha*, are some of the other mice told stories using collages.

P WALSH

Wells, Rosemary. *Sophie's terrible twos*.

Viking, 2014. The author of the Max & Ruby stories explores early childhood challenges with this mouse and again in *Shy Charles*.

P WELLS

HOW TO FIND THESE BOOKS:


P = a picture book; these are shelved alphabetically by the author's last name in cubbies NP of the stairs.

P [Powerwall] = These color coded picture books are in cubbies opposite the regular picture books, organized alphabetically under themes like Alphabets, Colors, etc.

In the catalog, just put in some keywords (from the title, author or both); click the "Place Hold" button, and we will find the book for you! You will need your library card number and last 4 digits of your phone number.

Or, just ask! Library staff love to help you locate books! Many titles are also available as e-books or audiobooks, or kits (CD+book).
